Thanks to Busy Graham and Carpe Diem, we were treated to a Crankie Shadow Puppet Show at the Village Hall on the evening of October 22nd. It was a uniquely charming visual story-telling by Katherine Fahey (paper artist) and Dan Van Allen (puppeteer). Bees and their honey, a dancing skeleton from New Orleans, and a local tale of black cats* were featured in three stories delightfully depicted in a mesmerizing scrolling panorama. The story unrolls as the scroll is cranked across the stage, lit from behind with both cut-paper scenery and moving shadows of puppets. Shown here are the artists, the stage in closed position projecting the intricate cutouts on its doors, backstage with the puppets at the ready and one of the story scenes.
