Claiborne: A Regional Kite Surfing Hot Spot By Adam Grant (Regional Stringer for the Claiborne Clarion)

The Maryland/DC area contains 50 or so of us wind addicted kite surfers and it's not uncommon to drive hours to find the right spot and atmospheric conditions. When it blows from the northwest, most from the western shore kiters will go to Terrapin Park

in Stevensville due to its proximity to the bridge. It's an okay spot but open bay water, shipping lanes and "DC kiters" create choppy crowded waters. Those of us

who know better come to Claiborne, and we don't talk about it on the open kite

forums. The Claiborne cove (Broad Cove) offers perfect geography to make use of a northwesterly wind, the prevailing frontal wind in the Chesapeake. Clean wind and smooth water are the most coveted conditions for the kiter and it's very rare to find a shallow protected cove with good wind exposure. With the whole fetch of the Eastern Bay, there is little landmass to interrupt the wind. The jetty at the northern end of the mouth provides a break from the incoming swell without disrupting the airflow due to its absence of buildings or tall trees. On a north wind, you can ride into the cove, right up to the dock, on glassy smooth water. This condition is fondly known to kiters as a "slick" because strong wind and smooth water don't usually coexist. On the outside of the cove, the gentle sandy shoal smooths out the swell by increasing the wavelength and lining up the peaks creating a visual effect of giant corn rows. On a big wind day, you ride through the trough and have chest-high wave peaks on each side of you to bank off of like a half-pipe. These wave peaks also create great ramps to launch from. These perfect conditions, coupled with the beauty of the spot and the warmth of the local spectators make Claiborne a favorite for us lucky few that know it

and love it.

First, it is a fun website. Here, you can post a picture of you and your friends and your dog, wading in the Chesapeake Bay. Add a small banner if you like or dress in silly costumes. It could be a picture of your family wading together or of some of the people you work with in the office. You choose. Most importantly, the picture should represent your love of the Bay and your personal connection to it. In addition, a location of where the picture was taken needs to be indicated. Only pictures taken wading in the Bay should be submitted. (Please, no pictures wading in Ocean City or your backyard pool.) And keep them tasteful - this site is intended to be used and viewed by everyone. A map of the bay and its tributaries will be posted so that you will be able to click on your location and see yourself "wading in the water". Second, it is an educational tool and a portal website. We plan to include a list of names & addresses of environmental organizations, such as the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and Mid- Shore Riverkeepers, which are out there working for the Bay's health & restoration. Here, you will be able to read about these organizations and what important things they are accomplishing. If some of these organizations appeal to you, there will be an easy way to connect directly to their websites to find out more. Ideally, we hope that you will decide to volunteer for them and or support them with your money.

Third, it is website where you can express your artistic talents. We encourage you to send in your artwork and photographs that are either inspired by the Chesapeake Bay's beauty or by her problems. A picture of a sunset over the Eastern Bay or a picture of garbage washed up along her shores is equally acceptable. Finally, we encourage musicians to send in a video of their rendition of the spiritual song, "Wade in the Water". It could be a video of you singing the song, your band, your school or your church choir. You can find the words and music on the internet but most importantly, make the song your own....Start singing!
