A VISIT WITH BOB TODD



This month's editors, Rob and Suzanne Todd, had the pleasure of recently visiting with Bob Todd (sadly no relation to us) to follow up on a chat we had with him this past winter at the Claiborne Café in the Village Hall. During that chat he mentioned something about a "Poor Man's Yacht Club" back in the 50's. This piqued our interest then, so we asked him for details.

It seems about 20 to 30 local men would gather at the Claiborne boat dock for boat races off Claiborne and on the Miles River. The boats were called

"whirlwinds", light round bottomed boats with small outboards that were capable of making the boats jump out of the water. Apparently, a hat was passed around to purchase a keg of beer. Membership cost \$5 or \$10. This group met for boat races for roughly two to three years. These men were the ones who installed the first boat ramp made of concrete slabs at

the dock. This brings to mind the escapades of our current mighty crew of sailors who just finished a very successful sailing season on their boat the Claiborne Ferry. More about that later on in this issue.

Back to Bob. Bob joined the Air Force in 1943. He was sent to Europe and spent time in Scotland, England, France, Belgium, and Germany. Bob participated in the Battle of the Bulge and was what he called "cannon"

fodder". He was later transferred into the infantry in the Army and was sent to the island of Luzon in the Philippines to conduct mop-up operations. While there, he contracted malaria and came home December 24, 1945 after three years of service. Bob's two brothers were also in the service and luckily returned home safely.



After the war, Bob lived in Secretary, MD where he had been born. He worked as a mechanic at Yale Sportswear in Easton. At one point Bob also worked in Cambridge where he met his wife, Alma. Bob said they first met on a blind date that was arranged by Alma's mother's cousin. Bob and Alma later married and moved to St. Michaels in 1950. Bob became the maintenance manager at the Yale Sportswear factory. They eventually found Claiborne and moved into what is now Phil and Sarah Sayre's house on Bayside Drive. It had just been rebuilt after a fire. They lived in that house until they bought the house on Claiborne Road in which he still lives.

Bob had wanted to be a lineman or a carpenter but decided that working on the water was what he really wanted to do. So a hobby became a job for him as he became a waterman, crabbing and oystering at Tilghman Island. When we asked Bob what Alma thought about his new career, he said she was fine with it and that "she was a good girl".

Bob also enjoys woodworking. He has made 30 to 35 miniature Chesapeake workboats. He has sold or given away most of them but still has six on display in his living room. The first one he made is named Alma, and he built his last one in 2012. Jake Flory was lucky enough to win one of Bob's boats in a Claiborne raffle a few years ago.

Bob and Alma had a daughter, Caroline who is a nurse and lives in Easton. He also has a granddaughter, Valerie. Alma passed away in January, 2009.

These days Bob likes to spend Wednesday mornings at the Senior Center


in St. Michaels at what he refers to as the "old geezers club". Bob may be

This year, with another new sail plus good winds in June and July, Claiborne Ferry finished first in the Wednesday night series and second in the Frostbite series.
