Potluck and Concert


Friday, June 19, will be a three-event evening:

Living and Aging in Claiborne & The Village Concept

Under the leadership of Patti and Kirke, a group of Claibornites began the discussion on how to create an environment that would provide all of us the ability to stay in our community as we age. Our goal was to explore ways to expand our current options and to develop a series of initiatives that build on things we already do for each other. At the same time, a group of Talbot County citizens was exploring a similar concept for all of Talbot County and introduced their work at a public meeting in November, which Patti and I attended. From this initial meeting, the Exploratory Committee for Helping Citizens Age in Place in Talbot County was formed. It is made up of a coalition of community service organizations, elder care providers, experts on aging and concerned citizens, who have joined forces to explore introducing the national "Village Concept" to Talbot County. I am a member of this group.

A village, in this context, is defined as a network of neighbors helping neighbors by providing support services and the social and educational programs needed to help older adults stay in their homes and remain active in their communities for as long as possible. Many of the services offered are the same as those identified as necessary at our Claiborne meetings --- such as transportation, socialization, help with small repairs, and a person who is always available by telephone to help find information and services.

The first step, of course, is to find out what the needs are right now. To answer this question, the committee is reaching out to citizens and village leaders, asking them to participate in a community focus group to determine if the Village Concept can help fill any senior care service gaps that may exist in Talbot County. This focus group includes discussions and a survey that will help the committee gather information on existing elder-care services, determine the demand for these services, evaluate cost factors, and identify local volunteers who may be interested in helping to provide services to Talbot County's older adults.

The committee has already held six community meetings -- two in St. Michaels, two in Easton, and two in Cordova -- to gather information and feedback. Two additional meetings will be held in Trappe on Wednesday, June 10, from 2 to 3:30 PM and 6:30- 8 PM (location to be announced). There may be an additional meeting in St. Michaels on June 29.

The more voices that are heard, and the more questions that are asked, the better the results will be. So if you'd like to attend any of these meetings please contact me at Patflory@gmail.com
